We look forward to working with CAHPS families this school year to help all of our students reach their highest potential.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

The annual report card, issued by the Oregon Department of Education, provides a data-driven perspective of student achievement in the areas of reading, writing, science and mathematics. In 2014-2015, the SBAC, or Smarter Balanced Test, was issued to students in the spring of their junior year. Unlike the OAKS test that has been issued in years prior and focused primarily on academia, the SBAC is designed to give schools and their communities a better gauge for how well a school prepares students in the areas of academia and college and career readiness.

While a school's report card is a mere snap shot of how we perform and what we do in our schools each year, Crater BIS feels confident that we are on the right track toward serving all students and families, and our scores reflect our hard work.

For the 2014-2015 school year, Crater School of Business, Innovation and Science, in the area of language arts and writing, led the region with 85% of students meeting the required benchmark; this score was significantly better than the state average of 67%. Furthermore, 54% of BIS students exceeded the benchmark, outperforming the state average of 33%. In math, BIS students outperformed the state average by 13%. Additionally, the BIS graduation rate ranks among the top three in the region at 79.4%.

Outside the state-wide ranking system, BIS was recognized by U.S. News & World Report as one of America's best high schools.

Crater School of Business, Innovation and Science is proud not only of its students and their hard work but of its teachers and support staff who strive each day to get to know kids and to teach to individual talents. 
